## INTRODUCTION

IBCC has been a result of the restructuring and reconstitution through the Act of Parliament, the Act XIII of 2023 called the Inter Boards Coordination Commission Act, 2023. IBCC has been established for effective coordination among examining bodies operating in the country to bring uniformity in standardization of the examination & assessment system at SSC & HSSC Level and exchange information among the member boards and allied member organizations.



## MISSION STATEMENT

Maintenance of uniformity among educational Boards through effective coordination for evaluation/ assessment standards in the examination system by introducing a variety of modern techniques. Transforming educational boards' activities in a way to fulfill futuristic needs and maintain liaison among the member boards in accordance with prevailing new trends in the field of education within the domain of IBCC's mandate.



## FUNCTIONS

1. Recommend exam reforms and uniform examination & assessment policies.
2. Authenticate/Attest SSC and HSSC (Grade 10 & 12) certificates.
3. Equivalence up to the Higher Secondary Level against local and foreign qualifications.
4. Promote Curricular and Co-curricular activities (sports, debates etc.)
5. Capacity building of the teachers, paper setters, assessors, and examination staff.
6. Regulate Foreign Examination Boards operating in the country.
7. Develop and promote National and International Linkages with examining bodies.



# ADMINISTRATIVE TRANSFORMATIONS



## ENACTMENT

The enactment of IBCC in 2023 marked a significant milestone in the educational landscape of the country. IBCC was restructured and reconstituted as the Inter Boards Coordination Commission through Act XIII of 2023, known as the Inter Boards Coordination Commission Act, 2023. The enactment also



empowered the organization to foster effective coordination among examining bodies in the country, enhancing the educational evaluation and coordination landscape. This development reflects the commitment to excellence and collaboration in education, paving the way for a more streamlined and standardized assessment system.

## State of the art Facilitation Center

As part of our commitment to providing a conducive work environment and maximum facilitation to



the public, the capacity of the regional office in Lahore has been enhanced by establishing a state-of-the-art and spacious facilitation center. The center has been designed to provide our valued visitors with a welcoming atmosphere, ensuring ease of access and convenience for individuals seeking various services, information, or assistance.

# TECHNOLOGY BASED IMPROVEMENTS

## 1. DOCUMENT VERIFICATION PORTAL



National and international organizations frequently require confirmation of the validity of equivalence certificates and attestations issued by the IBCC. The implementation of an online verification portal with QR code functionality has transformed the process of document authentication. This user-friendly interface has increased trust and integrity, providing stakeholders with a dependable platform to verify certificates and tackle fraudulent activities.

## 2. SECURE ONLINE PAYMENT MECHANISM



Earlier, the students had to visit designated branches of the National Bank of Pakistan (NBP) or use Easypaisa for fee submission of attestation and equivalence. IBCC collaborated with 1-link to introduce a secure online payment mechanism that has provided multiple options to the students by using any mobile banking application etc, thus providing ease in fee submission.

## 3. INTEGRATION WITH EDUCATION BOARDS



IBCC requires documents to be verified by the issuing board for attestation purposes. The verification process for Secondary School Certificate (SSC) & Higher Secondary School Certificate (HSSC) certificates has been streamlined by seamless integration with online Application Programming Interfaces (APIs) from education boards. By eliminating unnecessary hurdles, IBCC has facilitated applicants and reduced processing time, reaffirming the organization's commitment to service excellence.

## 4. UNIFORM SERVICE STANDARDS



Previously, the regional offices of IBCC were not linked to a centralized database. However, with the expansion of the attestation and equivalence portals and connecting all regional offices, inclusivity and accessibility have been achieved. This strategic deployment has ensured uniform service standards across all offices, facilitating students with seamless access to essential services.

## 5. QUEUE MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS



Queue Management Systems are being utilized at IBCC Secretariat and Regional offices to optimize customer service processes, enhance efficiency and improve customer satisfaction. This has streamlined service delivery, minimized waiting time and improved overall efficiency in achieving operational excellence.

## 6. REAL-TIME STATUS UPDATES



The applicants are provided with real-time application status updates via Email/SMS, enhancing transparency and facilitating applicants with timely information. This streamlined communication process fosters greater engagement, reduces uncertainty, and ensures a smoother experience throughout the application process.

## 7. PERFORMANCE EVALUATION OF THE STAFF



The attestation and equivalence processes are embedded with performance evaluation framework of staff, fostering a culture of excellence and accountability. This comprehensive approach not only ensures the recognition of individual contributions but also facilitates targeted professional development initiatives, continuous improvement and organizational success.

## 8. ROBUST SECURITY FEATURES



IBCC equivalence and attestation portals were hosted using Windows Server technology. IBCC reinforced its infrastructure by proactively migrating IBCC portals from Windows to Linux servers enhancing system stability, efficiency, and security to safeguard sensitive data and operations against evolving cyber threats.

## 9. RESILIENT DATABASE BACKUP MECHANISM



To ensure that the student's data is protected against various threats and for Disaster Recovery a resilient database backup mechanism has been established. This proactive measure ensures data integrity and operational continuity, mitigating risks and sustaining stakeholder confidence. The maintenance of various logs has improved the organization's ability to monitor and optimize database performance. The IBCC team leverages actionable insights to enhance efficiency, and responsiveness and ensure seamless stakeholder satisfaction.

## 10. IMPROVED HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS



IBCC made significant upgrades to the attendance and leave management system. Employees now have employee cards embedded with relevant details. These cards are linked to the system through secure access to the building making access control, time tracking, and attendance monitoring much easier. With the introduction of a new biometric attendance system, IBCC ensures accurate attendance records, reducing errors and encouraging punctuality. The leave management system now works alongside biometric attendance, making leave administration more efficient and transparent. These changes boost efficiency and lay the groundwork for a flexible and responsive HR system, essential for organizational adaptability.

# EXAMINATION REFORMS



## EFFECTIVE PRACTICAL EXAMINATIONS

The IBCC Forum continually strives to refine educational practices. There was a need to enhance the effectiveness of practical examinations. The assessment of practical knowledge plays a crucial role in gauging students' hands-on skills and application of theoretical knowledge. The forum formulated the recommendations to elevate the quality of practical examinations for a more comprehensive and impactful learning experience.

Based on recommendations of Sub-Committees, the Practical Based Assessment (PBA) method has been proposed. PBA is the process of evaluating students based on their practical skills, the application of theoretical knowledge, and their ability to solve problems in real-world scenarios. All examination boards would gradually shift towards the PBA model. This change will come into effect from the 1st annual examination of 2024.

## NEW GRADING SCHEME

In an effort to address the issue of excessive competition among students, parents, and educational institutions, and to protect students from psychological and societal pressures, a 10-point grading scale was introduced in 2022. This new system aims to provide a more comprehensive and fair evaluation of students' performance by replacing raw scores. The new grading scheme was supposed to be implemented in phases starting from 2023. While some boards did implement it, many provincial boards decided to start in 2024 after getting consent from their governments.



## INCLUSION OF 21st CENTURY SKILLS IN CURRICULUM

As we navigate the dynamic landscape of education in the 21st century, the curriculum must evolve to equip students with the skills necessary for success in an ever-changing world. The 21st century skills are being incorporated into the educational framework starting from the inclusion of financial literacy in the curriculum on recommendations of IBCC Forum.



## FACILITATING DIFFERENTLY-ABLED STUDENTS

Differently-abled students face unique challenges that can impact their ability to complete examinations within standard time limits. The IBCC forum is always committed to creating an inclusive and accessible learning environment and, therefore, allowed to grant extra time in examinations for differently-abled students. This ensures that all students, regardless of their abilities, have an equitable opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and skills during assessments.



## UNIFORM ACADEMIC CALENDAR

Exams will be held in March-April, allowing BISEs to declare results in May-June, aligning the admission process with the examination process for a smoother process for students across the country. The HSSC results were announced in August as per previous practice and universities have to rely on HSSC I results for merit determination. The Uniform Academic Calendar will allow universities to admit students on final HSSC results. The change in the schedule would also protect students from extreme weather conditions during exams, providing a more pleasant atmosphere for them.



## RESULT EVALUATION & ANALYSIS DASHBOARD (READ)

The Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (BISE) Sargodha proposed a tool to improve the examination processes and increase their efficiency, the Result Evaluation and Analysis Dashboard. This dashboard will be maintained by IBCC to provide each education board with a comprehensive platform for real-time data analysis, visualization, and decision-making. The innovative tool will enhance the effectiveness of examination processes and help education boards make informed decisions.

# CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES



## COMPETITIONS OF SOCIAL SKILLS

The Inter Board Competitions of Social Skills of students are being conducted as a part of a Co-curricular activities. The competitions includes Verbal and nonverbal communication skills, effective analysis of news on social media platforms, use of AI tools for completing assignments.

## MIND GAMES

Mind games like chess and scrabble offers a comprehensive learning experience that involves intellectual, emotional, and social development. These skills require critical thinking, memory, focus, mathematical skills, and strategic planning, instilling these abilities in players. These competitions have been included in Inter Boards Sports events.



## INTERNATIONAL OLYMPIAD IN INFORMATICS (IOI)

The IOI is an annual programming competition for secondary school students to showcase their problem-solving and algorithmic skills. Pakistani students will participate in IOI competitions from 2024, thanks to the efforts of the Pakistani government and FBISE Islamabad.

- viii.** Eswatini General Certificate of Secondary Education has been recognized for equivalence of SSC

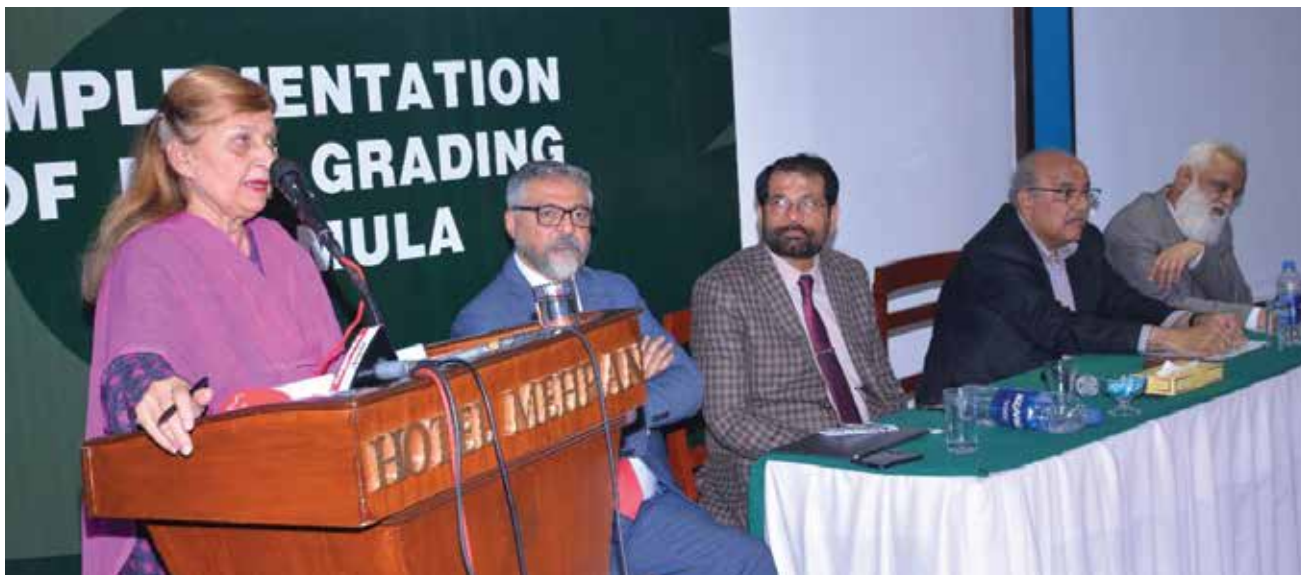
## NATIONAL INTER-BOARDS BILINGUAL DECLAMATION COMPETITIONS

# CONFERENCE RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Digitize the education system, urging continuous monitoring, curriculum planning, data analysis, and modern assessment methods to enhance tertiary education.
2. Stress upon the importance of conceptual knowledge and encouraging diversity in learning sources rather than relying on single textbooks.
3. Have a blend of formative assessment and summative assessment throughout the country.
4. Ensure transparent examination processes and the promotion of technology in assessment.
5. Underscore the significance of character building and the cultivation of critical thinking skills at all educational levels.
6. Build foundational knowledge and competencies before assessing students' quality.
7. Shift from quality control to quality assurance in education, with an emphasis on ethics.
8. Urge schools and colleges to prioritize students' mental and emotional development over test preparation.
9. Eliminate the root cause of the gap between Higher Secondary and Tertiary Education identified as a lack of foundational knowledge.
10. Promote the need for a transition from a fixed to a growth mindset in the education system of Pakistan to meet the demands of the digital era.
11. Give utmost significance to creativity and critical thinking as essential skills in the era of artificial intelligence (AI)
12. Enrich the underpinning of education, especially in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics), by integrating creativity using the perspective of "design thinking." This methodology revitalizes STEM, turning it into a dynamic model that not only conveys knowledge but also cultivates inventive problem-solving and innovation.
13. Focus on skills development and vocational training at secondary and higher secondary levels.
14. Prepare students to deal with real-world problems and contribute meaningfully to the economy after completing their education.

During the conference, concerns were raised about the absence of rational and inquiry-based learning, project-based knowledge, and skill-based teaching practices at secondary and higher secondary levels.

## Meeting with British Council Delegation

On January 17, 2023, a delegation from the British Council visited the Secretariat of IBCC in Islamabad. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the equivalence of UK qualifications and the acceptance of Pakistani qualifications in the United Kingdom.



During the meeting, the delegation met with Dr Ghulam Ali Mallah, the Executive Director of IBCC, and other key officials to explore opportunities for enhanced collaboration between the two organizations. A significant point of discussion was the process and criteria for equivalence of UK qualifications in Pakistan and the reciprocal acceptance of Pakistani qualifications in the UK. The officials expressed a strong interest in facilitating educational and professional pathways for students and professionals traveling between the two countries.

Additionally, the British Council delegation assured IBCC that they would facilitate examiners and assessors to develop a robust question item bank, with support from IBCC. This initiative aims to ensure high-quality assessment standards and create a more consistent examination process, benefiting both Pakistani and UK educational systems.

## Inauguration of the Facilitation Center

Federal Minister for Education Rana Tanveer Hussain visited IBCC Secretariat in Islamabad to inaugurate a series of new initiatives designed to improve student services and organizational efficiency. The newly launched facilities include a KIOSK, a Public Facilitation Centre, and an Online Portal for the verification of attestation certificates. These initiatives aim to streamline processes and reduce the need for in-person visits. With the introduction of QR-based attestation and equivalence certificates, students can now verify their documents from anywhere in the world almost instantly, enhancing convenience and reducing administrative bottlenecks. This step reflects IBCC's commitment to automating its processes and addressing student needs more efficiently.

The participants also discussed ways to facilitate students appearing in the second annual examination, ensuring timely admissions into degree programs, and establishing a criterion for determining merit in degree programs in the context of the grading scheme that BISEs plan to implement by 2025. Chairman HEC Dr. Mukhtar Ahmed expressed his commitment to providing maximum support to member BISEs of IBCC, including access to the Pakistan Education and Research Network (PERN). The meeting reflected a collaborative approach to improving educational standards and addressing key issues affecting university admissions and degree validation.

With this collaboration, students from all corners of Pakistan and overseas can now conveniently pay their attestation and equivalence fees through the 1Link 1Bill option available in all banking apps, ATM machines etc. This revolutionary move alleviates the inconvenience of traveling long distances to visit banks for fee submission.
